The 2023 Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) is an annual report of performance outcomes of HUD entitlement grants for the Fiscal Year 2023-24 (FY 2023-24) and cumulative plan years 2020-2024. In Table 1 below, the report provides comparison with goals set in the 2020-2024 Regional Ventura County Consolidated Plan under "Expected-Strategic Plan" and the outcomes of the fiscal year beginning with July 2023 through June 2024 under "Actual-Strategic Plan". Also, the 2023 Annual Action Plan (AAP) goals under the column headings "Expected-Program Year" and "Actual-Program Year". The "Percent Complete" is in relation to each respective comparison. The information herein meets the HUD requirements mandated in 24 CFR 91.520.

The City continues to fund activities to improve housing needs of low to moderate income individuals, address the needs of homeless persons, and improve community programs and development activities that will benefit low to moderate income residents. In FY 2020-21 the City received Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act for the CDBG and ESG programs to prevent, prepare for, and respond to Coronavirus. CARES Act actual accomplishments are not reflected in Table 1- Accomplishment-Program Year & Strategic Plan to Date, refer to Table 1A. A description of this year's CDBG-CV & ESG-CV accomplishments achieved is included as an attachment. In FY 2021-22 the City received HOME-ARP funds to provide housing services and shelter to individuals and families experiencing homelessness and other vulnerable populations.

Assess how the jurisdiction's use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.

Fiscal Year 2023-2024, CDBG activities addressing the priorities and specific objectives in the 2023 Annual Action Plan include the following outcomes: CDBG Public Services accomplishment total is 5,284 persons served; Total Housing units produced are 6; and the total persons benefiting the outcome of the Public Facilities and Improvements generated through the HUD programs are 230,370 persons in low- and moderate income areas. The grand total CDBG sum of accomplishments is 235,660 persons served, based on IDIS report PR-23 located in Exhibit V. However, the CDBG Public Service actual accomplishment total is 3,136 persons served. The difference of 2,148 was reflected in last year's CAPER due to the activities closed September 2023; those totals are referenced in PR-23 report in Exhibit V. Furthermore, the CDBG Public facilities and Improvements actual accomplishment is 19,745 persons and Housing accomplishment is zero units. The discrepancy of about 210,625 persons in Public Facilities-Fire Station Alerting Systems and is due to prior years activities from Fiscal Year 2020-2021 were deemed by HUD as an ineligible activity during the most recent monitoring review. This program year HUD has provided the determination and the City will close the activity in FY 2023-24. The Accomplishments of the Housing services in housing units were accounted for and referenced in the previous years' FY2020-21 CAPER and will be closed in FY2023-24. The actual CDBG sum of accomplishment grand total is 22,881. This includes 3,136 persons and 19,745 persons in low- and moderate income areas.

In FY 2023-24, Enhance Economic Stability goal: this goal includes an outcome of Jobs created or retained, and has had challenges throughout the pandemic years. The Business Assistance Loan program is expected to move forward in FY 2024-25. Furthermore, Business building rehabilitation actual accomplishment was zero due to the new project is expected to move forward in FY 2024-25.

Create Quality Neighborhoods: The difficulties encountered in meeting the CDBG funded goals for the Create Quality Neighborhoods goals include, the Low- and Moderate-Income Area project based on census tract areas, the Aspire Pocket Park project that was delayed during the FY 2023-24 program year, and is expected to move forward in FY 2024-25. Prior funded projects, Homeless Shelter Rehabilitation and Clearance-Off site

improvements activities at Cypress Place have commenced during this program year, however, the activity will continue through FY2024-25. Improve Supply of Affordable Housing goal: the down payment assistance goal of 10 households was not met in this year's AAP due to the lack of inventory and high interest rates. This reflected the difficulty for residents to secure a property to purchase. Therefore no households were provided down payment assistance in FY2023-24. Furthermore, increased the down payment assistance per qualified household to assist with the house purchase by the HUD guidelines. The project is expected to move forward in FY 2024-25.

New projects in the 2023-24 AAP Amendment: CDBG Site Acquisition project under Improve Affordable Housing & Enhance Economic Stability Goals, an Acquisition of Real Property with a ten-unit multi-family development by the Oxnard Housing Authority occurred in May 2024. Site address is 201 South D Street, Oxnard. The real property improvements will occur in the next fiscal year. Refer to Text- Continued.

Rehabilitation and Off-site improvements activities at Cypress Place have begun during this program year. The Homeless Shelter Rehabilitation will not proceed within the new year, however, the Cypress Place improvement activity will continue within the next fiscal year. Improve Supply of Affordable Housing goal: Activities within this project include Homebuyer Downpayment Assistance with the down payment assistance goal of 10 households. The project recently moved from the City administering the program to awarding a non-profit funds to execute the program. The non-profit, the Ventura County Community Development Corporation (VCCDC) met challenges in using the CDBG funding and was unsuccessful in assisting homebuyers through the use of CDBG funds this year due to the lack of inventory and high interest rates for the prospective buyers that qualified for the program. The project is expected to move forward in FY 2024-25.

New projects in the 2023-24 AAP Amendment: CDBG Site Acquisition project under Improve Affordable Housing & Enhance Economic Stability Goals, an Acquisition of Real Property with a ten-unit multi-family development by the Oxnard Housing Authority occurred in May 2024. Site address is 201 South D Street, Oxnard. A second property was acquired at 131 Seventh Street. Both properties are expected to serve low- and moderate-income renters. Real property improvements and new construction are planned in the next fiscal year.

HOME funds for Improve Supply of Affordable Housing goal: Two programs were awarded funds between this year and fiscal year 2022-23 -the first is Cabrillo Economic Development Corporation's (CEDC) Etting Road project, now known as Dolores Huerta Gardens, who secured all financing for the project in FY 2022-23. There are 11 HOME-Assisted Units included, with a total of 58 units to be constructed. The project is estimated to be completed in May 2025. The second is the first phase of Cypress Place at Garden City project with 15 HOME-assisted units out of a total of 90 units remains in construction in FY 2023-24. The project is estimated to be completed in April 2025. HOME- ARP: In May of 2023, HUD approved

the City of Oxnard's HOME-ARP Allocation Plan. Based on data and feedback received from the community, the City plans to use its HOME-ARP funding to support the creation of new affordable rental housing. The City has made conditional funding commitments to two developers (Many Mansions for Aspire Apartments and People's Self Help Housing for Cypress Phase. Each was awarded \$1.2 million. Both projects are in the process



of applying to state and federal financing programs to construct the projects. The City plans on committing its HOME ARP funds in FY 2024-25.

Narrative

Per the CDBG PR-23 report, CDBG programs assisted 5,275 total persons. This included an open persons count of 3,218 and completed count of 2,057. The completed count was reflected in last year's CAPER due to the activities closed September 2023; those counts are reflected on the PR-23 report. The CDBG actual count is 3,136 which is less by 82 persons due to an open activity and was reflected in previous CAPER. The CDBG program assisted 3,136 people with racial and ethnic composition as follows: 2,266 white, 68 Black or African American, 51 Asian, 14 American Indian or American Native, 8 Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander; the following data not included in above table: 3 American Indian/ Alaskan & White, 2 Asian & White, 3 Black/African American & White and 721 Other multi-racial people. There were 2,916 Hispanic and 220 Non-Hispanic. Per the CDBG PR-23 report, the following data under Housing is 6 total

households is indicated in the report due to an open activity and was reflected in previous CAPER. As indicated in CR-05 Narrative, the actual Housing accomplishments were zero households. Please refer to CDBG PR 23, Exhibit V as an attachment to this document.

HESG programs assisted 377 people with racial and ethnic composition as follows: 284 white, 42 Black or African American, 2 Asian, 4 American Indian or American Native, 2 Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 1 Middle Eastern, 21 Hispanic/ Latina/o, 7 Multiple Race, 1 client prefers not to answer, and 3 data not collected. Table above does not include the following data: 1 American Indian/Alaskan Native & Black, 4 American Indian/Alaskan Native & White, 2 Asian & White, 3 Black/African American & White. There were 210 Hispanic, 163 Non-Hispanic, 4 data not collected. Please refer to SAGE ESG CAPER as an attachment to this document

Per CDBG-CV PR-23, CDBG-CV programs assisted 239 people with racial and ethnic composition as follows: 192 White; 13 Black or African American, 1 Asian, 6 American Indian/Alaskan Native, 2 Native Hawaiian/ Other Pacific Islander, 25 Other multi-racial. There were 139 Hispanic and 100 Non-Hispanic. The data includes 229 for FY 2021-22 and 8 persons in FY 2022-23. In FY 2023-24, the actual person served was 25 people. ESG programs assisted 377 people with racial and ethnic composition as follows: 284 white, 42 Black or African American, 2 Asian, 4 American Indian or American Native, 2 Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 1 Middle Eastern, 21 Hispanic/ Latina/o, 7 Multiple Race, 1 client prefers not to answer, and 3 data not collected. Table above does not include the following data: 1 American Indian/Alaskan Native & Black, 4 American Indian/Alaskan Native & White, 2 Asian & White, 3 Black/African American & White. There were 210 Hispanic, 163 Non-Hispanic, 4 data not collected. Please refer to SAGE ESG CAPER as an attachment to this document.

ESG-CV program assisted 25 people with racial and ethnic composition as follows: 1 Black or African American, 1 American Indian or American and 7 White and Hispanic. There were 7 Hispanic, 2 Non-Hispanic. An additional 129 people were served but nor reflected in the SAGE report due to reporting for project was closed June 30, 2022 and unable to reopen. Per HOME PR 23, HOME program assisted zero total households. As indicated in CR-05 Narrative, the actual HOME accomplishments were zero households. The projects are in progress and will continue in FY 2024-25. Please refer to Exhibit XIII-HOME PR 23 as an attachment to this document.

Narrative

In the Fiscal Year 2023-24, the City of Oxnard received federal entitlement fund award allocations of \$3,190,667 for the three entitlement grants, CDBG \$2,213,917, HOME \$768,867 and HESG \$207,883 Additionally, in FY 2020-21 the City of Oxnard received CARES Act funds allocation of CDBG-CV \$3,088,367 and ESG-CV \$5,255,005. In FY 2021-22 the City of Oxnard received HOME-ARP funds allocation of \$2,772,021. The City is currently under a timeliness workout plan due to having an excessive balance of unexpended CDBG funds due to slow moving projects and the impacts related to the coronavirus. The City expended a total of \$4,479,028.61 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, \$617,716.63 in HOME Investment Partnerships Program funds, and \$231,678.48 in Emergency Solutions Grant program funds.

Advances have been provided to Oxnard Housing Authority in the amount of \$590,531.55 for the rehabilitation of 201 S. D. Street and EDC CDBG-CV Business Assistance Program for \$62,956.89. Program income is still in the process of being reconciled for prior and current year, so CDBG and HOME may have additionally recognized program income in a future CAPER. Also, a prior year expenditure is tied up in litigation so further action may be required and reported in a future CAPER.

Narrative

The following activities covered citywide and were designed with the objective to help reduce the poverty level of the low-income persons within the City: Homeless Shelter Improvements at 1450 South Rose Avenue. The Aspire Pocket Park, Community Center East Park, Wilson Park Inclusive Playground and Pleasant Valley Park Restroom Project activity covered low- to moderate-income neighborhoods with park improvement projects. The entire City of Oxnard is over 51% low- to moderate-income and we use citywide census tract data to meet the low- and moderate-income criteria.

The City owns land and parcels that are used for homeless services, youth, and senior residents. Other properties include parks that are aging and in desperate need of renovations, particularly those that the City's low-income residents use. The City comprised of over 50 neighborhoods in Oxnard. The majority of the city is over 60% low- and moderate-income. CDBG assisted three park projects in the Community Center East Park neighborhood-Tract 8600, BG 2, LMI 85.87%; Wilson neighborhood Tract 8700, BG 2, LMI 78.34%; and Pleasant Valley neighborhood, Tract 3010, BG 1, LMI 59.43%. Homeless Shelter Improvements and homeless services at 1450 South Rose Avenue. The Aspire Pocket Park is Tract 9100, BG 2, LMI 77.42%. The Site Acquisition at 201 South D Street is Tract 8700, BG3, LMI 88.89%.

HESG provided street outreach, emergency shelter, rapid re-housing, case management services to homeless individuals and families within the City of Oxnard.



Leveraging

Explain how federal funds leveraged additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements were satisfied, as well as how any publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that were used to address the needs identified in the plan.

In FY 2023-24 Many Mansions' Central Terrace project remains in the final stages of construction but has received its Temporary Certificate of Occupancy. The Central Terrace Project will provide 87 affordable rental units (including one unrestricted manager's unit). The estimated development budget is \$45,023,015. The City awarded Many Mansions \$1,250,000 in City Affordable Housing In-Lieu funds in the form of a loan. The project was also awarded 35 Section 8 Project Based Vouchers from the Oxnard Housing Authority (OHA), which will be used for 35 permanent supportive housing units within this development for formerly homeless households.

In FY 2023-24 Community Development Partners' (CDP) 2nd and B project (now known as Casa de Carmen) mixed-use development, with an estimated development budget of 35.8 million, continued construction with an estimated completion date of Summer 2025. The Casa de Carmen project will include homeless shelter space that would accommodate 110 beds, office space for leasing and supportive services, fifty-five permanent supportive housing units, and one unrestricted manager's unit. The project site is located on a former City-owned property located at 241 W Second Street in Downtown. The City executed a Disposition and Development Agreement (DDA) in March 2021 with Community Development Partners and The Housing Trust Ventura County (HTFVC) and transferred ownership of the property to the HTFVC in May 2022. The City awarded CDP \$1,500,000 in City Low-and Moderate-Income Housing Asset set-aside funds in the form of a loan. The project was also awarded 55 Section 8 Project Based Vouchers from the Oxnard Housing Authority (OHA), which will be used for 55 permanent supportive housing units within this development for formerly homeless households.

In FY 2023-24 Cabrillo Economic Development Corporation's (CEDC) Etting Road project, now known as Dolores Huerta Gardens, secured all financing for the project and was awarded 13 project based vouchers. The project will include 58 affordable rental units and was awarded \$1,854,000 in HOME funding. The project budget is \$34,220,914. There are 11 HOME Assisted Units. The project is estimated to be completed in May 2025. The project also received the following local funding: \$5,000,000 (California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) Joe Serna Farmworker Housing Grant); \$2,788,410 (HCD Veterans Housing and Homelessness Prevention Program); \$4,509,904 (California Community Reinvestment Corporation); \$380,000 (County of Ventura).

In FY 2022-23 the City awarded the first phase of this project HOME funding in the amount of \$1,600,000. The project also received \$1,500,000 in CDBG funds. In FY 23-24 the Project remains in construction. There will be 15 HOME assisted units. Total Development budget for the project is \$66,134,167. Other non-federal funding sources come from the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) which will provide a \$36,287,635 forgivable equity loan under the new Housing Accelerator Program and an \$8,180,344 loan under the HCD Joe Serna Farmworker Housing Program. PSSH also plans to take out a \$13,000,000 permanent loan. The project is estimated to be completed in April 2025.

HESG match for each project awarded in 1:1, dollar for dollar. The subrecipient provide an HESG annual report indicating accomplishment, number of persons assisted, and match source for the amount expended during the program year. The City provides a 1:1 HESG match through general funds that pay for staff salary.

Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

The City began collaborating with Ventura County Community Development Corporation (VCCDC), a local non-profit organization dedicated to creating affordable homeownership opportunities by providing financial assistance to first-time homebuyers. During the program year, VCCDC has been marketing the program to prospective eligible buyers. However, due to the lack of inventory and high interest rates, it's been difficult for clients to secure a property. Therefore no households were provided down payment assistance in FY 2023-24. However, the City increased the down payment assistance per qualified household to assist with the home purchase by the HUD guidelines. The project is expected to move forward in FY 2024-25

Due to lack of staffing the City was unable to administer a residential rehabilitation program in FY 2023-24 and as such no funding was allocated to administer a residential rehabilitation program and no units were rehabilitated. The City will do further research to see if CDBG funds can be used to award a grant to

a third party to administer the program or relaunch the program when the City is able to fill its existing vacancy.

The goal related to the production of 26 new units was not met because the affordable housing development project that was intended to be developed by Cabrillo Economic Development Corporation and funded with the use of HOME funds did not close on their construction financing until May 2023 and as such no new units have been developed. However, the Dolores Huerta Gardens, is not expected to be completed until Spring 2025 and will include 11 HOME assisted rental units set aside for farmworkers and veterans. The City has awarded the project \$1,854,000 in HOME funds. In addition, the Cypress Place Project received an award of HOME funds in FY 2022-23 totaling \$1,600,000, however, the project did not begin construction until late in FY 2022-23 and as such no HOME units have been developed. The project will include 90 affordable rental units, with 15 HOME assisted units that will be set aside for farmworkers. The Project is expected to be completed in November 2025. As such no units have been developed from this project either.

Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

In the City's future Annual Action Plans, the City will continue its commitment to providing affordable housing, based upon the availability of funds and a project's viability. The City anticipates that it will continue to focus its efforts on producing new affordable housing units and increase funding for that purpose. This will include HOME funding of the development of affordable multi-family rental housing. Additionally, the City anticipates allocating CDBG funding for Down Payment Assistance via a third party administrator of the program.

Narrative Information

As previously mentioned In Fiscal Year 2022-23 HOME program funding was used to award funding for the development of affordable rental housing. The Dolores Huerta Gardens and the Cypress Place at Garden City affordable rental projects were awarded a combined total of \$3,454,000 in HOME funding. However, these projects remained in construction in FY 2023-24 and are not expected to be completed until Fall 2024 and Mid 2026, respectively. No HOME funds were allocated for acquisition of ownership housing. The City awarded CDBG funding to Ventura County Community Development Corporation

(VCCDC), a non-profit organization, to administer a CDBG funded Down Payment Assistance program to fund at least 10 Oxnard residents in FY 2023-24. However, regarding the Down Payment Assistance Program it should be noted that there is also typically an insufficient amount of homes on the market that are affordable to low-income residents and higher interest rates, in spite of the down-payment assistance offered to them by the City or its subrecipients through the Down Payment Assistance program, so that is also an additional challenge. Therefore no households were provided down payment assistance in FY 2023-24. No funding was allocated to a residential rehabilitation program in FY 2023-24 but the City is currently recruiting for new staff that can assist in relaunching this program in future years.

Worst case scenario housing needs for those experiencing homeless situations that have been displaced, or live in dire substandard housing conditions can apply to the Section 8 Homeless Voucher Program. Oxnard Housing Authority (OHA) has created a homeless preference in issuance of Housing Choice Vouchers and is actively offering permanent housing opportunities. The program coordinates outreach efforts with the Oxnard navigation center in which the center has been focused on reaching the chronically homeless and encampment dwellers. OHA also works in conjunction with the Veteran Administration to administer housing vouchers for homeless veterans under the VASH program. This program targets chronically homeless veterans. Also, once developed, Many Mansion's Central Terrace and the Homeless Solutions Center (2nd and B) being developed by Community Development Partners will assist in providing permanent supportive housing for formerly homeless households.



CR-25 - Homeless and Other Special Needs 91.220(d, e); 91.320(d, e); 91.520(c)

Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through:

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City of Oxnard works with the Salvation Army to provide street outreach and case management services to homeless individuals and families living on the streets within the City of Oxnard. The outreach team works with people experiencing homelessness to determine needs and provide practical assistance, housing navigation, health services navigation and case management.

After receiving an Encampment Resolution Funding grant from the State of California to respond to people living unsheltered in encampments, the City launched a new an encampment response project that partnered with Ventura County Health Care Agency to provide outreach to people living in encampments, and provide relocation assistance including non-congregate shelter options.

The City and the Street Outreach team also participate in "One Stop" services that provide drop in services to homeless people living in Oxnard. This program provides services in areas frequented by homeless individuals. At this service, homeless individuals are able to access hygiene services including a shower, and connect with service providers including Salvation Army outreach services.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City of Oxnard has a year-round 110 bed emergency shelter (navigation center) operated by Mercy House. This shelter has 110 beds and provides a range of services including case management, practical assistance (including meals, showers, health services), and rapid re-housing services. There are also a number of smaller shelters operated in the City of Oxnard, including the Rescue Mission for men, Lighthouse for women, and Gabriel's House for women and children.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

Mercy House operates a rapid re-housing program funded in part by the City of Oxnard HESG funds. A key element in the intake process (Coordinated Entry) for the provision of assistance is a determination of the client's immediate need for shelter, or either an emergency or transitional nature, followed by efforts to match that individual with the appropriate service resources needed.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with

children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The Oxnard service providers network that operate HESG funded services to assist chronically homeless and families submit annual reports to Grants Management detailing the number of individuals and families receiving services for affordable housing and homeless prevention. Due to the lack of available affordable housing in Oxnard, individuals and families experiencing homelessness have a difficult time finding a home. This factor alone has exasperated the homeless crisis and has driven our direction towards a year-round emergency shelter.

Homeless services have worked with the Oxnard Housing Authority, and local Continuum of Care to plan the administration of Section 8 vouchers specifically designated for homeless individuals. By working with the CoC to administer these vouchers, homeless individuals and chronically homeless individuals and families are prioritized for these vouchers based on need.

The City of Oxnard also funds service providers who provide housing stability case management to people who were recently homeless who are now housed through a section 8 voucher. These services are offered by both the Salvation Army Street Outreach Team and the Mercy House Rapid Re-Housing Program.

The City continued a Rapid ReHousing Program with United Way of Ventura County to assist homeless individuals in successfully transitioning to stable housing. This program collaborates with case managers to assist clients to get "document ready" including accessing and improvising credit scores and working in conjunction with a landlord engagement component that can provide landlord incentives to assist clients in securing housing.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

The Oxnard Housing Authority (OHA) continues to administer 523 Public Housing units and 1,910 Housing Choice Vouchers. In order to address the needs of public housing residents through its Resident Services Program, it offers a variety of on-site services to families, including youth programs. The OHA also continues to operate a Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) program for Public Housing tenants and Housing Choice Voucher participants which promotes homeownership and economic self-sufficiency. The FSS Program provides one-on-one counseling and individual assistance to participant families. The average number of years a family remains in the FSS Program for both Public Housing and Section 8 is 5-7 years.

The Resident Services Program provides the following programs and resources to clients:

1) Linking residents with supportive services which enable participants to increase income and reduce the need for public assistance; 2) Referrals for residents to continue education at the local colleges, high school, vocational and adult education institutes; 3) Program workshops to promote the development of local strategies to coordinate the use of assistance for supportive services and resident empowerment; 4) Help improve living conditions for our elderly or disabled residents to age-in-place; 5) Collaboration with other City and community organizations for job/health community events; 6) Implementation of safety and security meetings with police department; 7) Assisting tenants who are mandated to do their monthly community service; 8) Community resource fairs; 9) Assisting residents with drug counseling, mental health and treatment services; 10) Boys and Girls Club After School Program (Squires Unit); 11) Computer labs in Colonia and Pleasant Valley Village.

Capital Fund Program accomplishments for FY 2023-2024 included, but not limited to, the following projects totaling \$2,569,496:

- 1. Completed Windows Replacement upgrade in Pleasant Valley Village (\$1,112,112)
- 2. Completed Kitchen Rehab at Scattered Sites (\$805,263)
- 3. Completed Althea Apartments ADA Conversion (\$652,121)

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

OHA has promoted homeownership by partnering with homeownership counseling agencies such as Cabrillo Economic Development (CEDC) and Ventura County Community Development Corporation (VCCDC) which offer homeownership services. In addition, families are informed of these services through the Family-Sufficiency Program and the distribution of flyers to all households.

OHA obtains tenant input for management decisions and operations through its formation each year of the Resident Advisory Board (RAB) which, through a series of meetings with staff, gives input into the formation of the OHA's Annual and 5-year Agency Plan. In addition, input is obtained from residents and

their representatives through staff participation on a regular basis at Tenant association meetings at Colonia Village, Pleasant Valley Village and at the Palm and Plaza senior buildings. The Housing Authority also has two Tenant Commissioners, appointed by the City's Mayor, who serve on the Housing Authority Board of Commissioners. They have also participated on the Resident Advisory Board (RAB).

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

There are no troubled PHA's within our jurisdiction.



CR-35 - Other Actions 91.220(j)-(k); 91.320(i)-(j)

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

The City of Oxnard is located on the south central Pacific coast of California, has a pleasant climate, and is close to major cultural amenities of the Los Angeles area, but without many of the characteristics of a dense metropolis which are often deemed negative. These desirable qualities and environmental features have resulting in spiraling land values that together with the relatively lower income levels of the City's population compared to neighboring areas, combine to present the primary barrier to affordable housing: the disparity between the high cost of housing in the area and the lack of economic resources to access that housing by a large percentage of the local workforce.

State law employs the term "constraints" to describe forces or efforts to restrain actions that would otherwise occur. Environmental review, general planning, zoning, and related local land use regulations and development standards are all extensions of local government's responsibility to protect life and property, minimize nuisances, and achieve a desired quality of life as expressed through a participatory democratic process. Certain "barriers" to affordability, then, can be the result of requirements by State Law (such as preparing and adopting a General Plan and conducting environmental reviews), adopted for safety or civil rights reasons (such as the imposition of seismic construction standards in quake-prone areas, or requiring compliance with accessibility or visitability design standards), or enacted to remedy or prevent a specific local issue (such as requiring landscaping to deter graffiti). The term "barrier", in this sense, should not be interpreted to mean that local development standards and development review procedures are inhibiting the provision of quality affordable housing that would otherwise be developed.

The City continues to consistently implement all policies and procedures, to review local development standards and development review procedures in such a way as to ensure that such do not have unintended negative consequences, and to improve policies and procedures so as to increase the opportunities and feasibility of developing affordable housing, especially for special needs and very low-and low-income units. The City's recent enactment of an ordinance codifying the reasonable accommodation provisions in the planning and development process exemplifies the effort to eliminate any such barriers. The strategy of the City is to continue its ongoing efforts to review all potential barriers to affordable housing that are within the City's power to address; to continue to pursue and utilize available funding for mortgage assistance and housing rehabilitation; and to continue to work with and partner with CHDOs and housing developers from the nonprofit and for-profit sectors to promote the development of affordable and special-needs housing.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Oxnard continued to provide a year-round temporary emergency shelter, Oxnard Navigation Center, operated by Mercy House. The shelter operates at a capacity of 110 beds. In FY 2023-24, the

navigation center served 206 individuals. In addition to shelter beds, the navigation center provides a range of services including case management, practical assistance (including meals, showers, health services), and rapid re-housing services.

Disabled persons are an underserved population group that are provided assistance by the Oxnard Housing Authority. Oxnard Housing Authority provides affordable housing through the Public Housing Assistance Program and the Housing Choice Voucher Program to seven hundred and ninety six (796) families where the head of household is disabled

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Oxnard continues to ensure that all units for which HOME or CDBG assistance is provided meet the lead based paint regulations, as required, including any applicable inspections. The City continues to collaborate with State and local health and child welfare agencies related to this issue. This includes reviewing health department data on the addresses of housing units in which children have been identified as lead-poisoned. In addition, the Oxnard Housing Authority reports zero incidents of poisoned children or children with an "Environmental Intervention Blood Lead Level (EIBLL) within public housing tenants or the Section 8 Program Housing Choice Voucher Program.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The Affordable Housing Division's primary activity is to provide gap financing assistance to CHDOs, affordable housing developers, and nonprofits to assist with first time homebuyer down payment assistance to increase the supply of affordable housing. The City began collaborating with Ventura County Community Development Corporation, a local non-profit organization dedicated to creating affordable homeownership opportunities by providing financial assistance to first-time homebuyers. The activity provides direct assistance to low- and very-low income families. And although these activities do not necessarily result in a reduction in the number of poverty-level households, they do elevate the quality of life for these residents.

During this fiscal year, the Salvation Army in Oxnard hosted a weekly "One Stop" drop in service organized by Ventura County Health Care Agency with multiple homeless service providers participating. The One Stop provides vital services to homeless individuals and families that are accessible and low barrier. Homeless individuals are able to walk up without an appointment and get connected to homeless services all at "one stop".

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The Affordable Housing and Rehabilitation Division has a history of successful collaboration with four non-profits and CHDOs including Cabrillo Economic Development Corporation, Many Mansions, Habitat for Humanity, and People Self-Help Housing in the development and preservation of affordable housing. While any relationship can always be strengthened, no significant gaps in the institutional relationship

between the City and these CHDOs and non-profit agencies have been identified.

Extensive public and private partnerships have been established and organized to address the City's housing, homeless and other community needs. For example, the City participates in various local and regional meetings to address service needs, throughout Ventura County.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City continues to collaborate with public and private housing and social services agencies to meet the goals and objectives of the Annual Plan. The coordination of housing assistance and services for homeless persons is implemented through a broad range of public and private funding of homeless services providers that reach chronically homeless individuals and families with children, veterans, unaccompanied youth, the recently-homeless, and those at risk of becoming homeless. The Homeless Programs Administrator coordinates and participates on multiple committees involving the public and social service agencies, including: Homeless Services Team Meetings, City of Oxnard Homeless Task Force, Ventura County Task Force on Homelessness, Community Intervention Court, CES Pathways to Home and multiple ad hoc groups formed by the local Continuum of Care (CoC).

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

In FY 2023-24, a total of 142 Oxnard households were provided with fair housing services through the Housing Rights Center (HRC). The City's Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing (AI), produced jointly with the County of Ventura and a consortium of other local governments, was finalized on June 30, 2020. The recommendations set forth in that AI were presented to the City's Community Relations Commission. In FY 2023-24, the HRC presented two educational workshops on Fair Housing Rights and Responsibilities for Oxnard residents, tenants, homeseekers, and housing providers. The workshops were conducted in a hybrid manner, in-person or by Zoom technology on February 21, 2024 and March 6, 2024. A third educational seminar on the fair housing regulations and updates was for Housing staff throughout Ventura County. These sessions were conducted remotely via webinar on February 15, 2024 and May 22, 2024.

Two types of educational seminars are provided by the Housing Rights Center. The first type is targeted towards members of the public, specifically tenants, homeseekers, property managers, housing providers, and real estate practitioners, and are designed to educate people on their fair housing rights and responsibilities, and how they can pursue redress if they believe that they may have been subject to unlawful discrimination. The second type of seminars presented by HRC are presented to the staff of local jurisdictions' housing and community development departments, and staff of local housing authorities, and are designed to educate those staff persons on fair housing laws and their responsibilities to enforce and implement non-discriminatory practices.

The 2020 Regional Analysis of Impediments (AI) covered the County of Ventura and all ten incorporated cities in the County, including Oxnard. That AI identified impediments in certain jurisdictions in the County, and set forth fourteen recommendations. The City of Oxnard will continue current practices as per the AI Recommendations.



CR-40 - Monitoring 91.220 and 91.230

Describe the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements

The City of Oxnard conducted on-site & desk monitoring of subrecipients for CDBG & HESG during the FY 2023-24. The following projects were monitored: two CDBG and two HESG. The monitoring included programmatic and financial review. The results of the monitoring are pending. The final results will be provided in next year's CAPER.

CDBG programs have the objectives to assist low- and moderate-income persons as well as reduce homelessness through its Public Facilities Improvements, Housing programs, Economic Development and Public Services programs. HESG programs have the objective to reduce homelessness and homeless prevention for individuals and families. The CDBG & HESG programs are monitored from the beginning until the completion of the projects as follows: (1)The starting point of the projects applications for HUD yearly allocation is done through a two-step process: showing potential applicants what the Proposal process entails and what is required for completion of the Application. In-person and virtual workshops were conducted by Housing Department staff to provide regulations and technical guidance to interested parties; (2)After the approval of the projects, follow-up virtual workshops for all sub-recipients are conducted to explain the agreements (MOU, Interdepartmental agreements, and subrecipients agreements), and to provide information on the invoices processing and technical assistance if needed; (3)Quarterly and Annual reports are submitted throughout the fiscal year. The report indicates summary and accomplishments of the program. The policies and procedure manuals include labor standard and minority business reporting requirements.

Affordable Housing and Rehabilitation Division (AHRD) staff monitors the owner-occupancy requirement by sending forms to households previously assisted through the homebuyer, rehabilitation, or mobile home replacement programs, as well as affordable restricted deed homeownership units such as inclusionary and State density bonus units. The process of sending out recertification forms and requesting various forms of proof such as utility bills, insurance declaration pages, and verification that property taxes have been paid, which also show that the situs property and the mailing address are the same, did not go out as planned. Recertification forms will be sent out for the last year's monitoring period of July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024, and July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023. Those will be mailed before the end of the first quarter of fiscal year 2023-2024 so that the initial review of recertifications submitted will be done in the first quarter or the beginning of the second quarter. Staff continues to receive information from insurance companies to enter into the Recertification spreadsheets. Staff investigated reports of non-owner occupancy, which resulted in either the default being cured or the home being put up for sale in most cases. Where defaults on non-owner occupancy or other defaults were found, a warning notice was sent to correct the matter. If not corrected, the Notice of Default either has been written or will be written, and the loan will be called if it is a loan. If it is a default of a resale restriction agreement or equity-share agreement, a Notice of Default is sent with the appropriate corrective measures to be taken within thirty days or the homeowner is required to sell the property.

Monitoring for rental housing units involved reviewing annual compliance reports. Those assisted with HOME-funded CHDO loans for new construction or rehabilitation of affordable rental housing continued with an on-site examination of tenant files, and visual inspection of the site was included in the physical inspections of the units required. Refer to Continue below.

CR-40 Monitoring Continued

During FY 2023-24, thirteen HOME-assisted units were inspected in four HOME-assisted Rental projects with the following results: 110 North D Street Apartments (1 passed, 3 failed), Camino Gonzalez (3 passed, 1 failed), Cypress Court Apartments (1 passed, 3 failed), and Villa Victoria (1 unit passed). The identified issues, ranging from electrical GFI malfunctions to tenant-caused issues with poor housekeeping, will be addressed with a commitment to reinspection. Those with failed inspections will be reinspected when the items are working properly until they are corrected. The Affordable Housing and Rehabilitation (AHRD) inspects HOME-assisted rental units and three to four non-HOME rental units to demonstrate that non-HOME-assisted units are comparable in amenities, maintenance, and size of the units when the project has both HOME and non-HOME units. The upcoming inspections for FY 2023-24 are scheduled for the end of the first quarter or the beginning of the second quarter of FY 2024-25, ensuring that all units meet the required standards. This will provide ample time for preparation and ensure that all units are ready for inspection. HUD's decisions have significantly impacted our inspection process. The required conversion of inspection systems from UPCS to NSPIRE was initially postponed until October 1, 2024, and then further delayed to October 1, 2025. However, HUD had already terminated the UPCS system last year. Our inspectors no longer have access to the UPCS inspection software. They are using the HQS inspection system to continue inspecting the units until the NSPIRE system meets HOME-assisted units' requirements. The City of Oxnard Affordable Housing will work on updating property standards and inspection policies based on the information for criteria for HOME and HTF units that HUD will release in the future. That will also include informing the HOME-assisted projects built, those currently under construction, and future projects to promote success for the CHDOs and other developers.

On September 5, 2024, the City of Oxnard issued a public notice for citizens to comment on the FY 2023-24 Consolidated Annual Performance Report (CAPER), the public comment period was from September 12, 2024 through September 26, 2024. This will provide citizens the opportunity to comment on the draft CAPER within the required 15-day comment period.

There were no public comments during the comment period. Grants Management does not control or monitor access to the copies for public review. An electronic version of documents available for public review are always made available on the City's Housing department website.

The Affordable Housing and Rehabilitation (AHRD) inspects HOME-assisted rental units and three to four non-HOME rental units to demonstrate that non-HOME-assisted units are comparable in amenities, maintenance, and size of the units when the project has both HOME units. The City conducted physical inspections on scheduled HOME-assisted units for the program catching up for COVID-19 Waivers. Additionally, the City extended the contract for UPCS inspection services to assist with the inspections moving forward. Inspections are being scheduled for September 2023.

All marketing and publicity for HOME assistance by the City of Oxnard Housing Department was carried out in accordance with affirmative marketing requirements. Oxnard's population is over 75% Hispanic origin, with a significant number of households utilizing Spanish as the primary language. The City's Housing Department ensures to provide notice information regarding the development of HOME assisted projects awarded HOME funding in both English and Spanish through the environmental review noticing process. This lets the public know that the units are going to be developed. Additionally the City requires developers of HOME assisted units to adhere to Affirmative Marketing requirements once they begin marketing the units, as a condition of funding.

The City began collaborating with Ventura County Community Development Corporation (VCCDC), a local non-profit organization dedicated to creating affordable homeownership opportunities by providing financial assistance to first-time homebuyers. During the program year, VCCDC has been marketing the program to prospective eligible buyers. However, due to the lack of inventory and high interest rates, it's been difficult for clients to secure a property. Therefore no households were provided downpayment assistance in FY 2023-24.

Describe other actions taken to foster and maintain affordable housing. 24 CFR 91.220(k) (STATES ONLY: Including the coordination of LIHTC with the development of affordable housing). 24 CFR 91.320(j)

In Fiscal Year 2021-22 two Affordable Housing Developments that the City provided gap-financing loans

to receive LIHTC funding. One development known as the 2nd and B Development (now renamed Casa De Carmen) is located in Downtown Oxnard at 241 W Second Street on a formerly City owned site that was donated for the purpose of developing this project. This Project will include 56 affordable permanent supportive housing rental units and a 110 bed homeless shelter. It began construction in June 2022 and will be completed in Summer 2025. The other Affordable Housing Development, known as Central Terrace Apartments, is also located in Downtown Oxnard at 217-235 East Sixth Street and will include 87 affordable rental units, 35 of which will be set aside as Permanent Supportive Housing units for formerly homeless households. Construction for this project began in Summer 2022 and will be completed in Summer of 2025.

In Fiscal Year 2022-23 the City awarded HOME funded gap-financing assistance to the Etting Road (now known as the Dolores Huerta Gardens) Project. This project will both be a 100% affordable rental development. Eleven of these units will be HOME assisted units. The City also awarded the Cypress Place at Garden City \$1,600,000 in HOME funding as a gap-financing loan. The project will be 100% affordable and include 90 units, 15 of which will be HOME assisted units.

HOME- ARP Accomplishment Narrative:

In May of 2023, HUD approved the City of Oxnard's HOME-ARP Allocation Plan. Based on data and feedback received from the community, the City plans to use its HOME-ARP funding to support the creation of new affordable rental housing. In FY 2023-24 the City issued conditional commitment letters for HOME-ARP funding to two affordable rental projects, pending a commitment of all funding needed to complete construction of each project. One of the projects that received conditional approval is the Aspire Apartments, it will include 88 affordable rental units, five will be HOME-ARP funded units. The other project is Cypress Place Phase II, it will include 60 affordable rental units, five will be HOME-ARP funded units.

In FY 2023-24 Turning Point Foundation (TPF) Our Place Safe Haven served 13 homeless adults with mentally health challenges who identify Oxnard as their community of residence by providing emergency shelter and a variety of services. TPF reported in the HMIS system a total of 48 unduplicated homeless adults during the year from localities across Ventura County which consisted of 13 who identified as

Oxnard residents. TPF provided overnight shelter, case management and support services aimed at stabilizing mental and physical health and obtaining permanent housing.

In FY 2023-24 the Salvation Army provided street outreach services to 322 homeless individuals. The Outreach team has continued working diligently with the homeless population by providing resources, meals, hygiene kits and vouchers on an as-need basis. The Outreach team provided case management and focused on rapid placement with connections to appropriate supportive services occurring concurrently, helping reduce the length of time a person remains homeless.

In FY 2023-24, United Way of Ventura County has utilized HESG funds to house 18 households and 25 individuals. HMIS is reporting 27 clients but there was a household of two entered by error into HESG who had been housed through another grant.

During FY 2023-24, Mercy House has served 15 homeless households including 15 individuals through the HESG program. Of those served 15 households have successfully secured housing exceeding the program's goal to house 8 households. The average length of time to secure housing has been 42 days. All 15 people served have exited the program, 100% have exited successfully to permanent housing destinations including 6 who have exited without an ongoing housing subsidy.

A Participating Jurisdiction (PJ) may start counting match contributions as of the beginning of Federal Fiscal Year 1993 (October 1, 1992). A jurisdiction not required to submit this report, either because it did not incur any match or because it had a full match reduction, may submit a HOME Match Report if it wishes. The match would count as excess match that is carried over to subsequent years. The match reported on this form must have been contributed during the reporting period (between October 1 and September 30).

Timing:

This form is to be submitted as part of the HOME APR on or before December 31. The original is sent to the HUD Field Office. One copy is sent to the

Office of Affordable Housing Programs, CGHF Room 7176, HUD, 451 7th Street, S.W. Washington, D.C. 20410.

The participating jurisdiction also keeps a copy.

Instructions for Part II:

- 1. Excess match from prior Federal fiscal year: Excess match carried over from prior Federal fiscal year
- 2. Match contributed during current Federal fiscal year: The total amount of match contributions for all projects listed under Part III in column 9 for the Federal fiscal year.

- year: The sum of excess match carried over from the prior Federal fiscal year (Part II. line 1) and the total match contribution for the current Federal fiscal year (Part II. line 2). This sum is the total match available for the Federal fiscal year.
- Match liability for current Federal fiscal year: The mount of match liability is available from HUD and is provided periodically to PJs. The match must be provided in the current year. The amount of match that must be provided is based on the amount of HOME funds drawn from the U.S. Treasury for HOME projects The amount of match required equals 25% of the amount drawn down for HOME projects during the Federal fiscal year. Excess match may be carried over and used to meet match liability for subsequent years (see Part II line 5). Funds drawn down for administrative costs, CHDO operating expenses, and CHDO capacity building do not have to be matched. Funds drawn down for CHDO seed money and/or technical assistance loans do not have to be matched if the project does not go forward. A jurisdiction is allowed to get a partial reduction (50%) of match if it meets one of two statutory distress criteria, indicating "fiscal distress," or else a full reduction (100%) of match if it meets both criteria, indicating "severe fiscal distress. The two criteria are poverty rate (must be equal to or greater than 125% of the average national family poverty rate to qualify for a reduction) and per capita income (must be less than 75% of the national average per capita income to qualify for a reduction). In addition, a jurisdiction can get a full reduction if it is declared a disaster area under the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Act.

3. Total match available for current Federal fiscal 5. Excess match carried over to next Federal fiscal year: The total match available for the current Federal fiscal year (Part II. line 3) minus the match liability for the current Federal fiscal year (Part II. line 4). Excess match may be carried over and applied to future HOME project match liability.

Instructions for Part III:

Project No. or Other ID: "Project number" is assigned by the C/MI System when the PJ makes a roject setup call. These projects involve at least some Treasury funds. If the HOME project does not involve Treasury funds, it must be identified with "other ID" as follows; the fiscal year (last two digits only), followed by a number (starting from "01" for the first non-Treasury-funded project of the fiscal year), and then at least one of the following abbreviations: "SF" for project using shortfall funds, "PI" for projects using program income, and "NON" for non-HOME-assisted affordable housing. Example: 93.01.SF, 93.02.PI, 93.03.NON, etc.

Shortfall funds are non-HOME funds used to make up the difference between the participation threshold and the amount of HOME funds allocated to the PJ; the participation threshold requirement applies only in the PJ's first year of eligibility. [§92.102]

Program income (also called "repayment income") is any return on the investment of HOME funds. This income must be deposited in the jurisdiction's HOME account to be used for HOME projects. [§92.503(b)]

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Non-HOME-assisted affordable housing is investment in housing not assisted by HOME funds that would qualify as "affordable housing" under the HOME Program definitions. "NON" funds must be contributed to a specific project; it is not sufficient to make a contribution to an entity engaged in developing affordable housing. [§92.219(b)]

- Date of Contribution: Enter the date of contribution. Multiple entries may be made on a single line as long as the contributions were made during the current fiscal year. In such cases, if the contributions were made at different dates during the year, enter the date of the last contribution.
- Cash: Cash contributions from non-Federal resources. This means the funds are contributed permanently to the HOME Program regardless of the form of investment the jurisdiction provides to a project. Therefore all repayment, interest, or other return on investment of the con-tribution must be deposited in the PJ's HOME account to be used for HOME projects. The PJ, non-Federal public entities (State/local governments), private entities, and individuals can make contributions. The grant equivalent of a below-market interest rate loan to the project is eligible when the loan is not repayable to the PJ's HOME account, [§92,220(a)(1)] In addition, a cash contribution can count as match if it is used for eligible costs defined under §92.206 (except administrative costs and CHDO operating expenses) or under §92.209, or for the following non-eligible costs: the value of non-Federal funds used to remove and relocate ECHO units to accommodate eligible tenants, a project reserve account for replacements, a project reserve account for unanticipated increases in operating costs, operating subsidies, or costs relating to the portion of a mixed-income or mixed-use project not related to the affordable housing units.
- 4. Foregone Taxes, Fees, Charges: Taxes, fees, and charges that are normally and customarily charged but have been waived, foregone, or deferred in a manner that achieves affordability of the HOME-assisted housing. This includes State tax credits for low-income housing development. The amount of real estate taxes may be based on the

- post-improvement property value. For those taxes, fees, or charges given for future years, the value is the present discounted cash value. [§92.220(a)(2)]
- Appraised Land/Real Property: The appraised value, before the HOME assistance is provided and minus any debt burden, lien, or other encumbrance, of land or other real property, not acquired with Federal resources. The appraisal must be made by an independent, certified appraiser. [§92.220(a)(3)]
- Required Infrastructure: The cost of investment, not made with Federal resources, in on-site and off-site infrastructure directly required for HOME-assisted affordable housing. The infrastructure must have been completed no earlier than 12 months before HOME funds were committed. [§92.220(a)(4)]
- Site preparation, Construction materials, Donated labor: The reasonable value of any site-preparation and construction materials, not acquired with Federal resources, and any donated or voluntary labor (see §92.354(b)) in connection with the site-preparation for, or construction or rehabilitation of, affordable housing. The value of site-preparation and construction materials is determined in accordance with the PJ's cost estimate procedures. The value of donated or voluntary labor is determined by a single rate ("labor rate") to be published annually in the Notice Of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the HOME Program. [§92.220(6)]
- 8. Bond Financing: Multifamily and single-family project bond financing must be validly issued by a State or local government (or an agency, instrumentality, or political subdivision thereof). 50% of a loan from bond proceeds made to a multifamily affordable housing project owner can count as match. 25% of a loan from bond proceeds made to a single-family, affordable housing project owner can count as match. Loans from all bond proceeds, including excess bond match from prior years, may not exceed 25% of a PI's total annual match contribution. [§92,220(a)(5)]. The amount in excess of the 25% cap for bonds may carry over, and the excess will count as part of the statutory limit of up to 25% per year. Requirements regarding

- bond financing as an eligible source of match will be available upon publication of the implementing regulation early in FY 1994.
- Total Match: Total of items 3 through 8. This is the total match contribution for each project identified in item 1.

Ineligible forms of match include:

- Fees/charges that are associated with the HOME Program only, rather than normally and customarily charged on all transactions or projects [§92.220(a)(2)]

PERFORMANCE MEASURES: Performance measures are in place to ensure the efficient administration of all HESG funded activities. Along with utilization of HMIS, these measures will hopefully help reduce the length of time of family and individuals remain homelessness, reduce the overall incidence of homelessness and monitor the overall use of emergency shelters. Some of the activity measures are as follows:

- Emergency Shelters: Excluding winter shelters, must document placement of a minimum of 10 percent of homeless persons or households served in the Program Year into transitional or permanent housing.
- Transitional Housing: must be able to document placement of a minimum of 50 percent of households who completed the transitional housing program in the Program Year into permanent housing. "Household" is defined as all clients including single individuals and families.
- Rapid Re-housing: must show continued housing of clients receiving assistance for at least three months after receiving assistance. This should be done via case management of clients, documentation and HMIS entry and exit dates.
- Eviction Prevention: must show continued housing of clients receiving assistance for at least three months. This should be done via case management of clients, documentation and HMIS entry and exit dates.
- All clients, with the exception of victims of domestic violence, must be entered into Regional HMIS within 15 days of receiving services and must be exited from the system within 30 day of program completion or termination.
- MINIMUM STANDARDS Sub-grantees are expected to have taken steps to meet the Minimum Standards for Homeless Programs within thirty days of executing the Program Year contract.

In FY 2023-24 Turning Point Foundation (TPF) Our Place Safe Haven served 13 homeless adults with mentally health challenges who identify Oxnard as their community of residence by providing emergency shelter and a variety of services. TPF reported in the HMIS system a total of 48 unduplicated homeless adults during the year from localities across Ventura County which consisted of 13 who identified as Oxnard residents. TPF provided overnight shelter, case management and support services aimed at stabilizing mental and physical health and obtaining permanent housing.

In FY 2023-24 the Salvation Army provided street outreach services to 322 homeless individuals. The Outreach team has continued working diligently with the homeless population by providing resources, meals, hygiene kits and vouchers on an as-need basis. The Outreach team provided case management and focused on rapid placement with connections to appropriate supportive services occurring concurrently, helping reduce the length of time a person remains homeless.

In FY 2023-24, United Way of Ventura County has utilized HESG funds to house 18 households and 25 individuals. HMIS is reporting 27 clients but there was a household of two entered by error into HESG who had been housed through another grant.

During FY 2023-24, Mercy House has served 15 homeless households including 15 individuals through the HESG program. Of those served 15 households have successfully secured housing exceeding the program's goal to house 8 households. The average length of time to secure housing has been 42 days. All 15 people served have exited the program, 100% have exited successfully to permanent housing destinations including 6 who have exited without an ongoing housing subsidy.

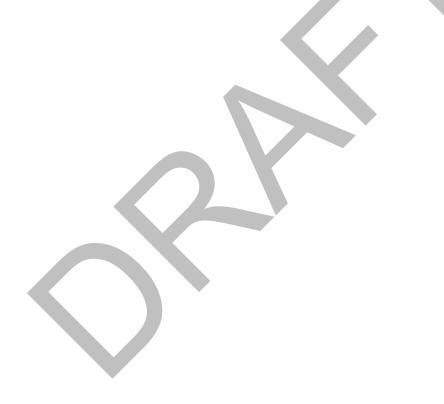

VCHCA Emergency Shelter program expenditures reported through June 30, 2022 totaled \$835,396.77, per FY2022 Q7 report. Reporting left blank for subsequent reports pending receipt of invoices. Now fully invoiced, expenditures for the VCHCA Emergency Shelter program through September 30, 2023 totaled \$1,491,000, VCHCA Emergency Shelter expenditures for the quarter ending September 30, 2023 are reported as \$655,603.23.

Additionally, reported expenditures for Emergency Shelter increased by \$80,559.63. When added to the expenditures reported for VCHCA Emergency Shelter, total Emergency Shelter expenses for this quarter have been reported as \$736,162.86.

This optional form is provided for recipients to provide any explanations or other information they believe would be helpful to HUD as they review this submission.

The VCHCA Street Outreach program was reported as closed September 30, 2022. However, \$1,964.97 in ESG-CV funding for Street Outreach had not yet been expended. This Street Outreach project had been closed for Sage reporting, therefore those expenditures have been added to the quarterly report ending September 30, 2023.

Administration expenditures had previously been reported as \$15,051.23. When reconciled, expenditures totaled \$5,584.58, with \$10,221.65 being reallocated to direct services.

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I. Introduction

Pursuant to Title 24, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 91.105, HUD entitlement cities are required to adopt a citizen participation plan. Subsection (a) requires that citizen participation plans adopted prior to August 17, 2015 need to incorporate newer provisions of the 24 CFR 91.105. The City of Oxnard originally adopted its Citizen Participation Plan on October 18, 1994. On July 25, 2000 the original document was amended. This amended Citizen Participation Plan will incorporate provisions to comply with 24 CFR 91.105.

II. Purpose of the Citizen Participation Plan

- A. The Citizen Participation Plan (CPP or Plan, hereafter) sets forth the policies and procedures for citizen participation in the development of the City of Oxnard (City) Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan, any substantial amendments to these plans, the preparation of the Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER), and the Assessment of Fair Housing (AFH), in coordination with the Oxnard Housing Authority (OHA).
- B. The City shall provide the public with a reasonable opportunity to comment on the original CPP and any amendments thereto. Amendments to the CPP may be considered substantial or less than substantial as determined by the City based on the nature of the amendment and applicable HUD regulations.

III. Encouragement of Citizen Participation

- A. A key component of the CPP is that it must provide for and encourage citizen participation, especially by low- and moderate-income persons, and in particular those persons living in areas designated by the City as a revitalization area or in a slum or blighted areas and residents of predominantly low- and moderate-income neighborhoods, and where CDBG funds are proposed to be used. The CPP must also include outreach to other public and private entities that assist with housing, health services, social services, community and regionally-based organizations that represent protected class members, and organizations that enforce fair housing laws. Outreach should also include public and private entities that represent areas that include targeted populations that qualify for services under the HUD programs represented under this Plan.
- B. The City shall explore alternative public involvement techniques and quantitative ways to measure efforts that encourage citizen participation in a shared vision for change in communities and neighborhoods. Efforts must be taken to encourage the participation of all its citizens, including minorities and non-English speaking persons, and persons with disabilities.

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IV. Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan Preparation

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires communities receiving funds under the Community Planning and Development formula grant programs to submit a multi-year consolidated plan and annual action plan. The City of Oxnard, in partnership with the County of Ventura, Cities of Camarillo, Simi Valley, Thousand Oaks and Ventura, to create a 5-year regional consolidated plan.

The consolidated plan establishes the City of Oxnard's goals and objectives for housing and community planning and development. A community must have a consolidated plan and action plan both approved by HUD before expending funds under the grant programs Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), including activities under the Section 108 loan program, HEARTH Emergency Shelter Grants (HESG), and HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME).

The consolidated plan is created to address the unmet public service and housing needs of lowincome persons and families within the City. For each consolidated plan period, an annual action plan is developed each year to identify specific activities, goals and funding allocations addressing the priorities established within the consolidated plan.

A minimum of two (2) public hearings, held at different stages of the Consolidated Plan citizen participation process, will be held for the purpose of obtaining the views of citizens and formulating or responding to proposals and questions. The two plans, the Consolidated Plan and the Action Plan, both require a 30-day public comment period, allowing the public and stakeholders the ability to respond, in writing or verbal, on the items proposed in each.

V. Environmental Reviews

The City maintains a written record of the environmental review undertaken for every project or program receiving federal funds from HUD. This environmental review record is available for public inspection. Certain projects require publication of specific actions or findings, which include a description of the activity, its location, and identification of any measures required to mitigate potentially significant adverse effects. Public comment periods are included in the review process as prescribed by NEPA and 24 CFR Part 58.

VI. Citizen Participation for Section 108 Loan Guarantee Program

- A. In accordance with Section 108 regulations, Subpart M-Loan Guarantees, 24 CFR 570.704, the City will comply with the following pre-submission and citizen participation requirements before submitting an application for Section 108 loan guarantee assistance to HUD. These requirements will also apply to the submission of an Economic Development Initiative (EDI), and Brownfield Economic Development Initiative (BEDI) application.
- 1. The City will develop a proposed application to include the community development

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objectives and activities the City proposes to pursue and carry out with the Section 108 funds. Each activity will be described in sufficient detail, including the provision under which the project is eligible, the national objective it meets, the amount of funds expected to be used, and the activity's location to allow citizens to determine the degree to which they will be affected. The proposed application will also indicate which activities will generate program income and where citizens may obtain additional information about proposed activities. The proposed application will also include a description of the pledge of grants required under 24 CFR 570.705(b)(2).

- 2. The City will also publish a public notice which will include its proposed application providing citizens an opportunity to examine the application's contents and to make comments. The public notice will also advise citizens on how and where to submit comments as well as notify citizens of when and where a public hearing will be held at which they can provide further input on the proposed application. The public notice will be published at least 30 calendar days in advance of the public hearing.
- 3. A minimum of two (2) public hearings, held at different stages of the Consolidated Plan citizen participation process, will be held for the purpose of obtaining the views of citizens and formulating or responding to proposals and questions. At least one of these hearings will be held before submission of a Section 108 application to HUD to obtain the views of citizens on community development and housing needs. At the hearing, each activity will be described in sufficient detail including: the provision under which the project is eligible, the national objective to be met, the amount of funds expected to be used, and the activity's location so that citizens can determine the degree to which they will be affected.
- 4. Citizens will have up to 30 calendar days, plus the day of the public hearing, to comment. Once the City has published the public notice and held the public hearing, the City will determine if the proposed application needs to be modified, based on comments and views received, before submitting the application to HUD. Upon completion, the final application will be made available to the public at the City Clerk's office.

VII. Assessment of Fair Housing Plan/Analysis of Impediments Revisions and Administrative Updates (AFH/AI)

- A. The City shall provide community residents with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on revisions to the AFH/AI, as specified under 24 CFR 5.164.
- B. The City has determined that an AFH/AI revision is necessary when:
 - The material change in circumstances affects the information on which the AFH/AI is based;

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- The analysis, fair housing contributing factors, or the priorities and goals of the AFH/AI no longer reflect actual circumstances.
- C. The City will provide affected citizens a period of not less than 30 calendar days to make comments on a significant AFH/AI revision before it is implemented. Acceptable methods of meeting the citizen participation requirements include:
 - Publication of the availability of the substantial change(s) in a local newspaper. The
 publication will provide a link to a City Housing Department web page which will
 provide more detailed information on the significant revision(s) and how to provide
 comments.
 - Publication of any proposed change shall appear in a local newspaper whose primary circulation is within the area serving the community of affected citizens;
 - 3. Advertisement of the availability of the proposed change on the City's website;
 - Posting notices in public buildings within the City, which include, but are not limited to, public libraries; or,
 - Holding meetings with citizens' advisory groups within the area affected by the significant revision.
- D. Notification to the public shall advise citizens of how and where to submit comments on the proposed changes. A summary of these comments, and a summary of comments not accepted and the reasons therefore, shall be attached to the significant revision that is submitted to HUD.

VIII. Access to Meetings for Persons with Disabilities and Non-English Speaking Persons

- A. The Citizen Participation Plan shall provide for and encourage participation by all citizens, including minorities, non-English speaking persons, and persons with mobility, visual, or hearing impairments. Persons with disabilities needing special assistance to participate in the meetings shall contact the City Clerk's Office at least 72 hours prior to the meeting to ensure that mobility, visual or hearing impairments shall be accommodated.
- B. To accommodate non-English speaking persons, a translator shall be provided at each hearing and other translators may be made available upon request with at least three business days' notice. Requests can be made by email or telephone to the City Clerk's Office.

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IX. Public Outreach and Access

- A. The consolidated plan and annual action plan development processes shall include consultation with organizations that provide community services, public and private organizations, community based organizations, faith based organizations, philanthropic organizations, businesses and developers.
- B. Commencing with consolidated plans submitted on or after January 1, 2018, consultations must occur with broadband internet service providers, organizations engaged in narrowing the digital divide, agencies that manage flood prone areas, public land or water resources, and emergency management agencies.
- C. Citizens are encouraged to participate in an advisory role in the planning, implementation, and assessment of the projects recommended under the plan(s).
- D. Notices of public hearings meetings will be sent to members of the Inter-Neighborhood Council Committee (INCC), and the presidents of the public housing tenant advisory councils.

X. Funding Recommendations

- A. Prior to the adoption of the Consolidated Plan and/or Annual Action Plan by the City Council, the following information shall be made available to citizens, public agencies and other interested parties:
 - Grant funds that will be available or anticipated to be available for the proposed plan (including program income).
 - Range of activities that may be undertaken, including the estimated amount that will benefit persons of low- and moderate-income.
- B. A summary of the proposed Consolidated Plan and/or Annual Action Plan shall be published in at least one newspaper of local circulation and the announcement may also appear in at least one Spanish language newspaper of general circulation. Public service announcements may also be provided for local radio stations or on social media. The summary shall describe the plans and purpose of the plan(s) and include a list of the locations where copies of the entire plan(s) may be examined. At a minimum, digital or hard copies of the proposed plan(s) shall be available for public review on the City's website, at the main Oxnard Public Library, the City Clerk's Office, and the City's Housing Department offices on 435 South D St., Oxnard, CA.
- C. The Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan, and the activities to be funded shall be made available on the City's Housing Department, Grants Management web page.

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D. The Consolidated Plan and/or Annual Action Plan shall be made available for public comments for a minimum of 30 days prior to submission to HUD. Written comments can be mailed to the Grants Manager, City of Oxnard Housing Department, 435 South D Street, Oxnard, CA 93030 or emailed to grantsmanagement@oxnard.org.

XI. Displacement of Persons

The Citizen Participation Plan must, as required by 24 CFR Part 91, Section 91.105, "set forth the jurisdiction's plans to minimize displacement of persons and to assist any persons displaced...."

The City will pursue projects which promote affordable housing, i.e., new construction and rehabilitation, which will not dislocate persons or families. (Some temporary relocation may be required for rehabilitation projects). If permanent relocation is necessary (due to the acquisition of an occupied residence planned for major reconstruction or demolition, etc.), the City will comply with the Uniform Relocation and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 as amended, which establishes types and levels of assistance required depending upon the circumstances. Certification of compliance is included in the City of Oxnard Consolidated Plan.

XII. Public Hearings

- A. The public hearings will be held at City of Oxnard Council Chambers or in facilities in or adjacent to low and moderate-income neighborhoods. Public hearings may be scheduled during the evening to ensure the maximum attendance by residents.
- B. The City shall hold a minimum of two public hearings per plan year (fiscal year). The purpose of the hearings is to obtain public comments, to address housing and community development needs, and to outline the development of proposed activities, to address the unmet needs of low-and moderate-income persons regarding housing, community and economic development and public services. Notification of public hearings shall be published in news circulars, social media outlets, and the City's websites, and published within two weeks of the public hearing date.
- C. The first hearing may be held in facilities in or adjacent to low-moderate-income neighborhoods or City Council Chambers. The purpose of the initial hearing is to obtain the public comments on housing and community development needs, including priority nonhousing community development needs.
- D. An optional public hearing may be held to solicit public comment on activities which could be implemented to address the unmet needs identified at the first public hearing but prior to the adoption of the proposed plan by the City Council. The purpose of this hearing is to obtain citizens' comments on proposed activities and funding allocations.

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- E. The final public hearing will be held to obtain citizens' comments on proposed activities and to present the Consolidated Plan and/or the Annual Action Plan to the City Council for adoption. The final hearing shall be held in the City Council Chambers. Should an in-person meeting be infeasible, the City's meeting guidelines will be followed.
- F. The hearings shall be announced in at least one newspaper of general circulation in English. The announcement will also appear in at least one Spanish language newspaper of general circulation. The hearings may also be announced as a public announcement or radio stations and/or social media, as appropriate, and announced through an informational flyer distributed/posted by Housing Authorities, public service and other organizations. At least one Spanish language radio station may be informed and the flyer may be prepared in Spanish. The announcement for the public hearings shall also be e-mailed, or mailed upon request, to the current list of HUD partners, subrecipients and other interested parties in the City of Oxnard.

XIII. Technical Assistance

The City shall provide, upon request, technical assistance to organizations and individuals representative of low- and moderate-income residents wishing to develop proposals for funding assistance under any of the programs covered by the Consolidated Plan. The City shall determine the level and type of assistance consistent with HUD policies and questions.

XIV. Amendments to the Plan

A. The City shall amend its approved Consolidated Plan or Annual Action Plan if it comprises:

- A change in its allocation priorities;
- A decision to carry out an activity using funds not previously described in an action plan covered by the consolidated plan (including program income, reimbursements, repayment, recaptures, or reallocations from HUD); or
- A change in the purpose, scope, location, or beneficiaries of an activity occurs.
- B. Amendments will be considered <u>substantial changes</u> and require official action if it comprises any of the following:
 - Funds that are proposed for a new activity for the first time within a covered consolidated plan period;
 - A funding increase in a current activity or a change in the use of funding from one eligible activity to another by \$200,000 or more in CDBG or HOME funding, and over \$200,000 in ESG funding;

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- Aggregate changes of more than \$200,000 of an entire grant allocation between projects.
- C. Changes that are less than substantial represent less than the amounts listed in section XIV(B), and do not have a significant impact on the project's purpose, scope, location, or beneficiaries. If an activity is not funded in the current year, is the same or similar to an activity funded in another program year, and the addition is less than amounts above, with no significant change in the project (purpose, scope, location, or beneficiaries), it shall not be considered a substantial change. The authorized City official with the corresponding approval amounts may approve changes that are less than substantial.
- D. Reallocation of funding among program years is not considered a substantial change, if considered less than substantial as described in the amounts above.
- E. Program income will be allocated with the Annual Action Plan and in accordance with HUD requirements. If program income received is greater or less than the projected amount, it will be adjusted and used accordingly, and reported in both the year's CAPER and the subsequent Annual Action Plan as to how it was used or the planned use for the following year.
- F. The City must submit a copy of each amendment to HUD. HUD allows amendments as they occur, or at the end of the program year. Letters transmitting copies of amendments must be signed by the official representative of the City authorized to take such action.
- G. Substantial amendments of the Consolidated Plan or Annual Action Plan will require a 30-day public comment period and City Council approval. Notice of the public comment period will be posted on the City's Housing Department, Grants Management Division webpage and noticed in a newspaper of general circulation. A 30-day public comment period will be made available to obtain citizens' comments on the proposed substantial amendment and to present the substantial amendment to the City Council for adoption. Amendments not deemed substantial will be adjusted by the city and may not be presented to City Council, as they are considered administrative adjustments that do not meet the fiscal threshold that requires Council approval.

XV. Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER)

A. The City will prepare the Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) as required at the close of the grant year which shall be made available for public comment for a minimum of 15 days prior to submission to HUD.

Public comments will be accepted and responded to, as appropriate, with a summary of the comments attached to the CAPER for submittal to HUD.

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XVI. Availability of Documents

- A. The Consolidated Plan, Annual Action Plans, substantial amendments, CAPER and the Citizen Participation Plan will be available to the public, including the availability of materials in a form accessible to persons with disabilities upon request.
- B. Physical copies of the Consolidated Plan, Annual Action Plans, CAPER, the Citizen Participation Plan and the Uniform Relocation and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, as amended, shall be available for review at the City of Oxnard Housing Department, 435 South D Street, Oxnard, CA during the City's open operating hours. The reports described in this section may also be reviewed on the City's Housing Grants Management Division website at any time.

XVII. Citizen Participation Coordinator

- A. The Citizen Participation Coordinator shall be a member of Grants Management Division staff in the Housing Department of the City of Oxnard.
- B. The Citizen Participation Coordinator shall make programmatic and funding information available to citizens during all phases of the HUD Community Planning and Development Program cycle, upon request. Prior reports shall be made available within the most recent Consolidated Plan cycle. Prior Consolidated Plan items may be made available to provide a five-year period of activities for public review. Staff will retain prior year information as it complies with federal and local records retention schedules.

XVIII. Comments and Complaints

- A. The City shall consider all verbal or written comments or views of citizens received at the public hearings in preparing the final Consolidated Plan, Annual Action Plans, amendments to these plans, Section 108 Loan applications, CAPER or the Citizen Participation Plan.
- B. A summary of these comments or views shall be attached to the final Consolidated Plan, amendment to the Plan, CAPER or Citizen Participation Plan and submitted to HUD as appropriate.
- C. The City shall respond in a timely manner, within 15 days where practical, to all written complaints, grievances and requests for information about the Consolidated Plan.
- D. Written comments, complaints and/or grievances can be submitted to the Housing Director, City of Oxnard Housing Department, 435 South D Street, Oxnard, CA 93030.

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XIX. Contingency Plan in the Event of an Emergency/Disaster

- A. In the event of an emergency or disaster that presents a serious and immediate threat to the health and welfare of the citizens of the City, the noticing requirements for public hearings shall be reduced to the number of calendar days provided by the most stringent requirement within the local, state or federal statute provided during the time of the event.
- B. Reprogramming of funds in the event of such an emergency will require approval by the highest official, per City policies as described in the Code of Ordinances, Section 6, Emergency Organization and Functions, and Unfair Pricing. When emergency decisions require Council approval, the proposed reprogram of funds will be presented when Council is in session, or by ratification should the City of Council be in recess. If an accelerated emergency occurs, the most stringent approval requirement within the local, state, or federal statute will be followed.

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CITY OF OXNARD CITIZEN PARTICIPATION PLAN – Addendum FOR THE 2020 CARES ACT FUNDS, FLEXIBILITIES AND WAIVERS

A. POLICY STATEMENT

- This Citizen Participation Plan Addendum specifically addresses the special policies and guidelines in support of addressing the impacts of COVID-19 through the use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), and HOME Investment Partnerships Act (HOME) programs, and the 2020 CARES Act Funds, termed CDBG-CV and ESG-CV.
- 2. All policies and processes described in the City of Oxnard (hereinafter referred to as "City") Citizen Participation Plan, amended on July 10, 2018, is applicable to all CDBG, ESG and HOME funding sources unless specified in this Addendum.
- 3. All policies and processes specified in this Addendum are applicable through the adoption date of this Addendum and will expire upon the date specified for the CARES Act of 2020 funding and waivers, by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) department.

B. DEFINITIONS

- CARES Act Flexibilities and Waivers HUD Secretary issued statutory and regulatory waivers/alternative requirements for CDBG-CV, ESG-CV and some CDBG, HOME and ESG funds when necessary to expedite or facilitate the use of grant funds to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus. Prohibits waivers/alternative requirements related to fair housing, nondiscrimination, labor standards, and the environment. (see Appendix A: CARES ACT HUD Waivers Applicable to Citizen Participation Plan)
- CDBG-CV Community Development Block Grant funding specifically allocated for the impacts related to COVID-19
- ESG-CV Emergency Solutions Grant funding specifically allocated for the impacts related to COVID-19

C. PLANNING PROCESS FOR CONSOLIDATED PLAN DOCUMENTS

 Public Review and Comment – Documents (Plans) created for the CARES Act of 2020 funds and waivers will be made available to the public for no less than 5 calendar days. Written comments will be accepted during the public comment

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period. Summaries of comments will be attached to documents requiring public reviews and input.

D. MEETINGS AND HEARINGS

 During locally, state, or federally declared Stay-At-Home orders, public meetings may occur virtually and will publicly post meeting dates, times, and instructions in advance of the meetings.

Explanation: A CPD grantee may amend an approved consolidated plan in

accordance with 24 CFR 91.505. Substantial amendments to the consolidated plan are subject to the citizen participation process in the grantee's citizen participation plan. The citizen participation plan must provide citizens with 30 days to comment on substantial

amendments.

Justification: Given the need to expedite actions to respond to COVID-19, HUD

waives 24 CFR 91.105(c)(2) and (k), 91.115(c)(2) and (i) as specified below, in order to balance the need to respond quickly to the growing spread and effects of COVID-19 with the statutory requirement to provide reasonable notice and opportunity for citizens to comment on substantial amendments concerning the proposed uses of CDBG, HOME, HTF, HOPWA or ESG funds.

Applicability: This 30-day minimum for the required public comment period is

waived for substantial amendments, provided that no less than 5 days are provided for public comments on each substantial amendment. The waiver is available through the end of the recipient's 2020 program year. Any recipient wishing to undertake further amendments to prior year plans following the 2020 program year can do so during the development of its FY 2021 Annual Action

Plan.

2. Citizen Participation Reasonable Notice and Opportunity to

Comment Requirement: Reasonable Notice and Opportunity to

Comment.

Citations: 24 CFR 91.105(c)(2) and (k), 24 CFR 91.115(c)(2) and (i) and 24

CFR 91.401

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Explanation:

As noted above, the regulations at 24 CFR 91.105 (for local governments) and 91.115 (for States) set forth the citizen participation plan requirements for recipients. For substantial amendments to the consolidated plan, the regulations require the recipient to follow its citizen participation plan to provide citizens with reasonable notice and opportunity to comment. The citizen participation plan must state how reasonable notice and

opportunity to comment will be given.

Justification:

HUD recognizes the efforts to contain COVID-19 require limiting public gatherings, such as those often used to obtain citizen participation, and that there is a need to respond quickly to the growing spread and effects of COVID-19. Therefore, HUD waives 24 CFR 91.105(c)(2) and (k), 24 CFR 91.115(c)(2) and (i) and 24 CFR 91.401 as specified below to allow these grantees to determine what constitutes reasonable notice and opportunity to comment given their circumstances.

Applicability: This authority is in effect through the end of the 2020 program year.



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
